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Message from our Chair

Since becoming the Chair in May 2017 I have been working to achieve 3 main goals:

1. To increase awareness of Healthwatch Sunderland amongst stakeholders, partners and the public.
2. To recruit new board members to strengthen our knowledge and experience.
3. To support our fantastic staff and volunteer team.

Firstly, in increasing awareness of Healthwatch Sunderland, much has been achieved but yet more needs to be done. I have created good links with partners and stakeholders but we still need to do more to raise awareness with patients and the public.

Secondly, we have four new board members who bring a great range of skills and knowledge and help us to be very much more effective.

Thirdly I hope that I have brought board leadership and direction to the staff and volunteers and we now work together as one effective team.

The last year has been a very busy one with several major pieces of work in relation to Care Homes in the city, the work going on in the NHS in relation to the alignment of services within Sunderland and South Tyneside, and not least the proposals for health and social care providers to form an Alliance to better work together across the city.

These are major changes that Healthwatch Sunderland has been very much involved with and we have contributed patient and public views and worked hard to ensure those views have been heard. You can read more about our work in these areas throughout this report.



We have also been working on; Community Equipment Services, the Great North Care Record, undertaking Enter and View in Primary Care, and Accessible Information Standards.

We like to recognise those health and social care workers who the public have told us have made a positive difference to their lives, and our team have been busy presenting them with Star Awards.

Our Engagement Team have been out and about in the community listening to your views - watch out for our stalls and invite us to your groups in the coming year - we want to hear from you!

I want to thank everyone involved with Healthwatch Sunderland for their unstinting work throughout the year and their unwavering commitment to making sure the voice of patients and public is heard by decision makers in the city.

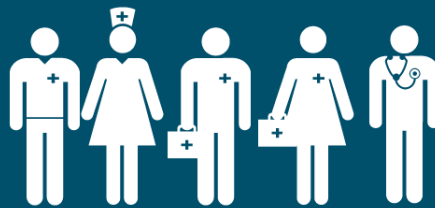


Highlights from our year

Listening to people's views

During 2017/2018 we focused on getting out and about to hear from the people of Sunderland and to let them know about us.

We gathered over 3000 pieces of feedback on health and social care services in Sunderland, this was collected via various stalls and engagement events in the community.

With the help of our volunteers we held 89 information stands in 40 locations and attended 61 events in the local community.

Many of the information stands took place where health and social care services are, ensuring we were reaching people who access services.

We also joined up with other organisations at larger public engagement events; such as City of Sunderland Council, Sunderland University, HMRC, Sunderland Recovery College, Healthy Steps, along with many others.

Finally we worked with organisations supporting the local community and attended their coffee mornings, and organised meetings.

Making sure services work for you

We gathered feedback on Dr Singh, a GP Practice in Sunderland, and carried out an Enter and View on the service.

Enter and View enables us to enter premises to observe matters relating to health and social care services.

The purpose of this Enter and View was to:

- Observe the environment and facilities of the practice.
- To identify any best practice of service provision.
- To give staff the opportunity to highlight their work.
- To speak to patients about their experience of the practice.

The findings of this work highlighted some good practice and also led to two recommendations.

Sunderland Surgical Day Unit

We received this nomination for Star Service from Sunderland People First for the work the unit do to support people with learning disabilities or autism. The team offer people who find hospital visits difficult, the opportunity to arrange pre-visits, make changes to the environment and coordinate multiple procedures to avoid repeat visits. Andy from Sunderland People First said...

Helping you find the answers



How we have helped the community get the information they need

Searching for care home accommodation is a difficult and emotional one, made harder due to a lack of real information beyond basic details and marketing material available.

We decided to tackle this issue and provide an insight into what life is really like for a resident and their loved ones in the care homes across Sunderland - answering the questions we would all have before making one of the most important decisions of our lives. So, in October 2017 we commenced an ambitious project to undertake independent reviews on all the care homes in the Sunderland localities - 47 in all!

And so the work began...

Our Engagement Team, alongside our Healthwatch Champion volunteers have been visiting all 47 residential and care homes currently available to older people across Sunderland to find out what care home life is really like.

As part of the visits the Healthwatch team have formulated surveys to gain information and feedback from residents, their friends and relatives, as well as the staff who work at the homes.

Based on 8 key indicators the surveys have been devised to be used in a care home setting and focus specifically on issues of quality, such as how much residents and family can have a say in how the home



is run, and whether residents are able to pursue their hobbies etc.

Some of the questions the Healthwatch Sunderland team have asked the residents include:

- What do you think of the food here?
- Is there enough choice of what you eat and when you eat?
- What are the staff like here?
- Do the staff have the time to stop and chat with you?
- Do you get a chance to do any of the things you used to enjoy before you came here?
- Do you get asked for your feedback about the home?
- Have you seen a dentist to check your teeth or an optician to check your eyes recently?

“I had to find a home for my husband at short notice after he had been in hospital. I was given a list of homes and had to work my way around them, with no additional information about the homes themselves.

This work would have helped me a lot.”

“People often come to me in a distressed state, and are overwhelmed at the choice they need to make.

I’ll definitely be using these reports - they will take some of that uncertainty away about the future. Thank you.”

The Healthwatch Sunderland Engagement Team and volunteers have really enjoyed visiting the care homes in Sunderland and meeting some of their fabulous residents.

We've had more than a few laughs on our way, we've sang and danced, played bingo and reminisced, but one thing is for sure, we have thoroughly enjoyed listening to the wonderful stories the residents have had to tell and meeting the dedicated staff teams who look after them.

The feedback so far

Feedback so far has indicated that the work has been well received by members of the public, local voluntary and community sector organisations, and local MPs. Many of the friends and relatives we speak to on our visits mention how they wish this type of information had been available to them when they had these decisions to make.

So what's next?

Now the work has been done, the reports we have wrote are now accessible on our website and those of some of our key partners. A radio advert has also been developed and recorded and is being played on Sunderland Hospital radio station, but we need to promote the work further to ensure those who need the information have access to it therefore we are working with students from Sunderland University who have agreed to develop a promotional video. This will highlight some of the activities and personal stories from some of the residents we have met during our care home visits.

The aim is that our promotional video will be shown on local health centre TV screens, in addition our Engagement team and volunteers will take it 'on the road' to reach as many people across Sunderland as possible.

How we work with other organisations and help influence change

We are proud to work alongside and in collaboration with service providers, commissioners, regulators and other partners to bring about change.

Great North Care Record

During October and November 2017, we held two public events to gain your views on the Great North Care Record (GNCR). The GNCR programme aims to join up patient records in front line care - making the North East the safest place in the world to receive care.

Your feedback at these events is being used in shaping the GNCR programme, and influencing the decision making process.

Path to Excellence (Sustainability and Transformation Partnership)

This last year has seen significant developments in the alliance of South Tyneside and Sunderland Hospitals. The public consultation for phase one of the Path to Excellence Programme closed on October 2017, and preparatory planning for Phase Two is underway.

Healthwatch Sunderland are working with the programme's communication team to encourage public involvement, and ensure the decision makers are listening to feedback.

Multi-Speciality Community Provider (MCP)

Following public engagement activity by Sunderland Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) in November and December 2017, we wrote to the

CCG on your behalf, raising questions you wanted to know the answers to. Our letter and CCG's response is available to read in full on our website - we continue to monitor this piece of change closely.

...and lots more...

- We have shared the intelligence in our Care Home Life Reports with the Care Quality Commission (CQC), and regularly share public feedback we gather at our events and stalls with them too.
- Feedback we receive from the public has helped create the 56 reports we have published this year. All this data is shared with Healthwatch England and contributes to national reports; influencing at a strategic level.
- Our Chair has a seat on the Health and Wellbeing Board (a forum for key leaders from the local health and care system working together to improve the health and wellbeing of our local population), promoting the interests of the public of Sunderland.
- Our team of thirteen volunteers have been out and about with you, the public of Sunderland, to listen to your experiences, and understand what is important to you!
- Our board members and staff sit on over 20 local committees, boards, groups and forums, led by organisations including the local authority, and Sunderland CCG, putting your interests at the heart of health and social care activity.
- Our work with GP practices to highlight the impact of missed GP appointments on waiting lists gained the interest of a local reporter on the Sunderland Echo who published a front page article highlighting the importance of cancelling GP and other primary care staff appointments when they are no longer needed.

We will continue our support of regional programmes such as the Path to Excellence and Urgent Care changes which are being managed by Sunderland Clinical Commissioning Group.



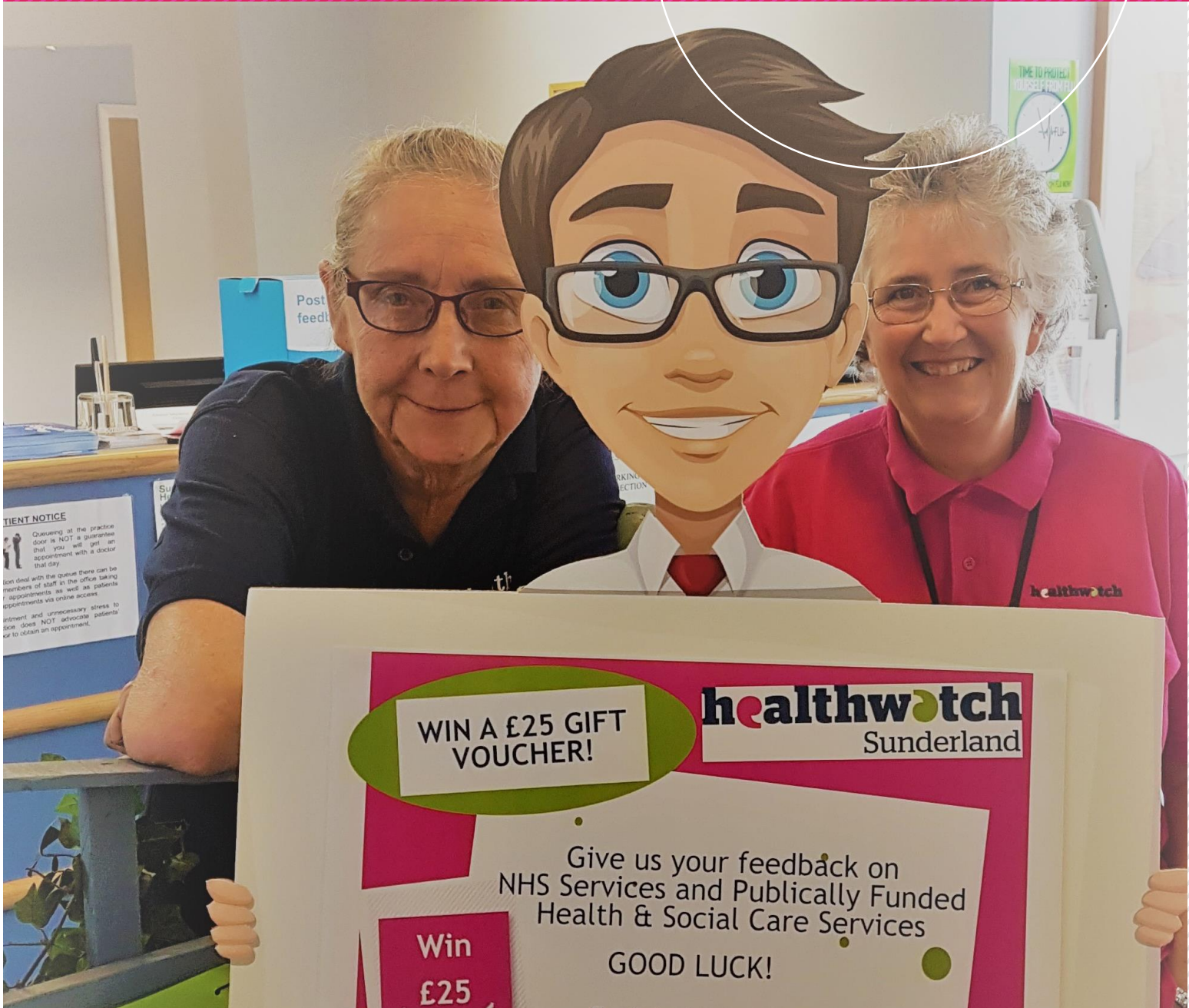
Our priorities for next year
